At their January meeting they will be finishing up their Operation Smile dolls and getting them packed and ready to ship out. Members enjoyed participating in this worthwhile cause.

Their crafts and spice mixes were a success at the Fall Conference as well as at local Christmas Craft Sales. Now members are busy making more "one-of-a-kind" items. They have also had two "make-and-take" jewelry sessions for our members and have assisted residents with various crafts at the Redington Memorial Home. Club members decorated a tree to honor our troops at the Redington Memorial Home and involved the residents with making some of the decorations. Holiday cards were sent to veterans.

At their November meeting, they had a program on other local organizations who also provide service to our community. The December meeting was their annual "Yelling Auction". Club members are looking forward to programs on "Skowhegan Main Street" accomplishments, a historical view of "Life in early

Skowhegan", and on a community "gem", the Lakewood Theatre.

The club donated funds to help purchase lights for a Christmas Tree in the down town sponsored by Main Street Skowhegan. The club also decorated a tree at the Redington Memorial Home and received a check for second place for their efforts. A little PR goes a long ways – this is a list compiled by this chairman from a variety of GFWC resources, including the GFWC history that GFWC 1st VP Babs Condon presented to us in October 2011 (currently available on our website – www.gfwcmaine.org).

Following is a snapshot of some of the amazing things we have to boast about as we share with others the things that make us proud to be a members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Let's raise the banner and blow the trumpets! Look what we have done!!

1898: GFWC convention attendees unanimously passed a resolution against child labor.

1910s: GFWC supported legislation for the eight-hour workday, workplace safety and inspection, and workmen's compensation. Members also supported prison reform legislation.

1916: GFWC worked with the Children's Bureau to promote National Baby Week. Over 2,000 clubs participated by focusing on infant and maternal mortality, birth registration, and public health facilities.

1919: Under the direction of the YMCA, GFWC created the Overseas Service Unit and sent 100 young women to Europe to assist wounded soldiers in the aftermath of World War I.

1924 - a GFWC California club woman came up with the idea of painting a white line down the middle of the roads as a safety measure! History tells us that she was almost run off the road by a large truck - which started her on the road of many long years of dedication to road safety. When she finally accomplished her goal of getting lines painted on her state highways to mark the center of the road - other states soon followed suit - because she had enlisted the aid of her fellow Federation members across the country. How many lives did GFWC clubs save with this idea?

By the 1930's GFWC women's clubs were credited by the American Library Association with establishing 75 percent of America's public libraries - - and as you well know, supporting local libraries continues to be a Federation priority today.

During WWII - in 1944: GFWC had a Buy a Bomber campaign where state federations sold war bonds worth over \$154 million -

enough money to purchase 431 planes.

In 1945: GFWC was one of the five women's organizations chosen to participate in the conference to form the United Nations. At the conference, GFWC representatives supported the ratification of the United Nations Charter.

In 1960: Brighten the Night was a nationwide Federation campaign for street lighting to prevent crime and accidents.

In 1961: GFWC's Women's Crusade for Seat Belts program resulted in the installation of more than one million seat belts over the course of one year.

In 1984: GFWC founded the Women's History and Resource Center dedicated to collecting, preserving, interpreting, and promoting all of the histories, contributions and records of our proud 121 year history of volunteer service.

1990s: GFWC actively supported the passage of the Violence Against Women Act; the Americans With Disabilities Act; the Family and Medical Leave Act; and legislation supporting handgun control.

1997: GFWC renewed its commitment to libraries with a project called Libraries 2000. Over the next five years, GFWC clubwomen raised and donated \$13.5 million to public libraries and public school libraries across the nation.

During the 2000-2002 administration, GFWC members contributed over \$200,000 to fully fund an Operation Smile Mission to the Philippines. Babs Condon, GFWC First Vice President shared with us about her experience on the mission as she was the GFWC chairman for this and saw the amazing transformation of over 1000 children's lives - one smile at a time - which resulted from GFWC members donations.

Did you know that since 1984 GFWC clubwoman have funded more than 10 complete Operation Smile missions to fix cleft lips and cleft palates of young adults and children in developing countries? Where would these children and young adults be without GFWC?

During the 2004-2006 administration, GFWC members contributed \$180,000 for a fully-equipped ambulance for use by the New York Fire Department in response to the loss of equipment suffered during 9/11.

GFWC has earned a reputation as a powerful force in the fight against domestic violence. During the 2006-2008 administration, our members donated over \$15.9 million dollars to DV shelters and organizations who work towards eradicating domestic violence.

GFWC clubs have donated over \$60 million dollars to Domestic Violence Shelters across our country. We have adopted

Domestic Violence Awareness as our Signature Project.

We have a such a rich history . . . and the *future* will be impacted as well, by the things that GFWC members do to enhance the lives of others through community service!

AVAILABILITY OF BOOKS THAT WERE DISCUSSED AT FALL CONFERENCE

Maine in History and Romance:

This book is a reprint of the 1915 edition, published by the Lewiston Journal, the first ever published by a federation of women's clubs in the United States. It came about through the publication of a series of articles in competition for prizes offered by the Lewiston Journal, and confined wholly to members of the women's clubs comprising the Maine Federation. The decision to publish these articles in book form was made at

the annual meeting of the Maine Federation at Biddeford in October, 1915.

The stories that were selected for publication almost a century ago stand out as among the best which includes not only the history of the State of Maine, but also show the character and writing style of that day, and are truly a grand selection of historical fiction.

The Trail of the Maine Pioneer:

This book is a reprint of the 1916 edition, published by the Lewiston Journal. In "The Trail of the Maine Pioneer," the club women of Maine offer a second book of Maine historical stories, a companion volume to "Maine in History and Romance." Like the first book, "The Trail of the Maine Pioneer" is a collection of prize stories resulting from a contest conducted by the Lewiston Journal in 1916 and open only to the club women affiliated with the Maine Federation.

The stories that were selected for publication almost a century ago stand out as among the best which includes not only the history of the State of Maine, but also show the character and writing style of that day, and are truly a grand selection of historical fiction.

These books are currently (as of this writing) located in Mr. Paperback stores in Waterville, and soon to be Dover-Foxcroft. The publisher has not heard from yet, the manager of the Ellsworth store, but expects they will want

to place them there as well. That being said, any Mr. Paperback store can get them, even if they do not carry them.

They are also available from my the publisher's web site: www.sameddypublishing.com, click on BOOKS. If anyone orders them from the web site the price is (\$18.95) plus Maine tax (\$.95) as well as \$3.00 postage (both books are the same price). Customers who reside outside Maine would not pay the sales tax of course. PayPal button is available for those who wish to pay by credit card; otherwise the publisher does accept checks mailed directly to him. All of the instructions are right on the web site.

"I was actually a bit surprised when I searched the Internet and found out that the Federation still exists. I was searching to see if there were any other books done, or, more importantly (and maybe you can help here), I was searching for where the stories that were not selected for publication might be. I am very curious about the stories that were not selected by the Committee, as I would like to have read them. I am sure, though, that they are long gone. If you ever find them, please let me know.

As for mentioning them to your general membership, please do!

Let It Snow!” This song was created by lyricist Sammy Cahn and composer Jule Styne in 1945. The words and lyrics convey feelings of warmth and security, which is how we want our members to feel about GFWC! If we are having problems retaining *current* members, then actively recruiting new members is useless. We must make the effort to show that we KNOW our GFWC members are the HEART of Federation.

In many parts of the country the months of January and February are cold and dreary— the perfect time for clubs to get warm and cozy and focus on rekindling the sparks and renewing the Federation passion. The holidays have taken a toll on many of our diets and January is the time to take back control. Clubs could use the weekly celebrations of “Healthy Weight Week” or “Diet Resolution Week” and sponsor a friendly weight loss competition. Divide into teams and support each other’s diets, take exercise classes, or go on long walks. The wager could be that the team that was NOT the biggest losers would make the healthy snacks for the next meeting. This project would not only have health benefits for members, but be a great way to build stronger working relationships within the club.

How about planning a trip to the spa to celebrate “Hunt for Happiness Week”? Oh, how nice it would be to pampered, and how fun to share the experience with club friends! What about a new “Secret Sister” project to put into action “Random Action Month”? Are all your club members as computer savvy as they would like to be? How about arranging a basic computer class to acknowledge “High-Tech Month” or “Reaching Your Potential Month”? Contact the local high school and ask for a recommendation of a student to be your teacher. Many students need volunteer hours to graduate, which could lead to interest in a new Juniorette club.

To commemorate “National Mentoring Month,” develop a “Big Sister” or “Federation Buddy” program. Pair an experienced member with each of your newer members for at least their first year. These relationships allow new members to feel comfortable asking questions and current members to gain renewed pride in GFWC.

One way to make your members more secure is to host a community-wide women’s self-defense class for “Women's Self Empowerment Week” or “Personal Self-Defense Awareness Month.” The classes will not only help your members feel safer, but are a GREAT way to recruit new members.

February is also a gold mine of celebrations and observances such as Valentine’s Day, “Heart Month,” and “Chocolate Month.” Heart disease is the #1 killer of American women. Host a “Red Dress Heart Campaign” event and make a difference in women's lives by spreading *The Heart Truth*® to your members and in your community. Be sure to serve healthy snacks and treat your members to a Valentine of dark chocolate to show you care. Retention and recruitment events could easily be built around “Friendship Month,” “Send a Card to a Friend Day,” and “Make a Friend Day.”

Many of our clubs already KNOW that their members are the HEART of Federation and show them they care.

Secret Sister or Pal Programs

GFWC Seneca Junior Woman’s Club, South Carolina, established a Secret Sister Program. Each

Secret Sister sent small treats or cards to let her “Sister” know she was thinking about her throughout the year. Gifts are given for a member’s birthday, holidays, and other special occasions. At the last meeting of the year, the identities of the Secret Sisters are revealed.

GFWC Carlsbad Junior Woman’s Club, California, instituted a fun Secret Pal program for its membership. Everyone really looks forward to receiving their little gifts and cards.

GFWC East Springfield Junior Women’s Club, Ohio, retains members with their Secret Sisters program, and by taking time before business meetings for “sharing time.”

Mentor Programs

GFWC Illinois State Membership Chairman Shelli Fehr reports that their leadership recognizes the value of mentoring and included a goal to develop a **Club Mentors Program** into the 2010-2015 State Federation Strategic Plan. Several of their clubs have already incorporated mentoring into their membership retention program, such as the **GFWC Hinsdale Junior Women’s Club**, who maintained a group of ten New Member Advisors to guide members through their first year. The **GFWC Woman’s Club of Aurora** assigned the sponsoring member to the person she recruited, and the **GFWC Woodridge Junior Women’s Club** members paired up with new members to help them learn the ropes their first year. **GFWC Woman’s Club of Plainville, Connecticut**, initiated a “Mentor Program” for new members, pairing them with long term members for a seamless transition into the organization.

Unique Meetings

Ten potential members attended the **GFWC Boardman Poland Junior Women’s League, Ohio**, membership meeting in January, which was called “New Year, New Friends, New Stuff.” Vendors set up tables with interesting items for sale, and then donated a portion of their profits to the club. Even though the **GFWC Western Pocono Women’s Club, Pennsylvania**, did not have regular monthly meetings in the winter due to the weather, they met for lunch or had workshops in members’ homes.

GFWC Woman’s Club of Duquesne, Pennsylvania, held a Family Night to thank family members for supporting club members. A catered dinner, entertainment, and gifts for the children were part of the evening.

GFWC Paradise Valley Junior Women’s Club, Arizona, invited guests to a “Wear Our Hearts” membership social. Club members showcased their projects in a video that was thoroughly enjoyed by all attendees. Potential members also helped fill Valentine bags for the local St. Vincent DePaul. The beginning of a New Year is the perfect time for clubs to take on the revitalization challenge. Get creative and seize this opportunity to pamper the very heart of your club—your members! Take the words of entrepreneur Mary Kay Ash to heart: “Pretend that every single person you meet has a sign around his or her neck that says, 'Make me feel important.'” You know your members deserve no less than the very best!!!

An elderly Chinese woman had two large pots, each hung on the ends of a pole, which she carried across her neck. One of the pots had a crack in it while the other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water, at the end of the long walk from the stream to the house, the cracked pot arrived only half full. For a full two years this went on daily, with the woman bringing home only one and a half pots of water. Of course, the perfect pot was proud of its accomplishments. But the poor cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfection, and miserable that it could only do half of what it had been made to do.

After 2 years of what it perceived to be bitter failure, it spoke to the woman one day by the stream. "I am ashamed of myself, because this crack in my side causes water to leak out all the way back to your house." The old woman smiled, "Did you notice that there are flowers on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because I have always known about your flaw, so I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day while we walk back, you water them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate the table. Without you being just the way you are, there would not be this beauty to grace the house."

There is an Old Danish folktale about a spider that dropped by a long thread from the rafters of a huge barn and landed in a dark corner of it. There the spider set to work and spun himself an elaborate and beautiful web. When he had finished he stepped back to admire his handiwork. He caught sight of a single strand stretching up and out of sight. He thought to himself that this strand was out of place and sort of ruined the visual display and since he could not see what it was connected to it probably wasn't needed. So he cut off that one strand. Instantly the whole intricate web shriveled and collapsed. There was nothing left of his web without that fine connecting strand, even though the spider could not tell where that strand went.

Everyone brings their own special qualities. When we discount the importance of one (be it a strand in the web, a beam in a building, member in an organization) we weaken the whole. There was nothing left of his web without that fine connecting strand, even though the spider could not tell where that strand went. You personally may be more connected to one member than you are to another but it does not mean that you are not connected to the whole unit or any less vital to the strength of the unit. Let's remember that each of us has value and that we are valued by one another for various reasons and carry this lesson with us to other aspects of our lives. We all make a difference to someone.

These two stories were placed here to remind us that no one is perfect. That we each make contributions and although we may not see the significance of that contribution right away - it is still a part of the framework and fabric of the club and is an important part of reaching the club's goals.
