The next week they are looking forward to a presentation by

Marjorie Goodwin graced the meeting in late October and shared the news from the many diverse clubs in District 3/5. They were informed at a November meeting about the Head Start program in the area and the many ways it helps support families with children. The second meeting in November found members hard at work on two service projects.
