## President's Letter

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As you receive this edition of our GFWC Maine Newsletter, the holiday season will be on top of us! I just don't know where the time goes!

We are almost six months into this administration. It has been hectic as I was told it would be. It has also been filled with fun and laughter! A highlight is always meeting new friends, and renewing old friendships from far away.

Our Fall Conference at the Ramada Inn in Ellsworth was an exciting time! Some of our special moments are listed as follows:

•GFWC Maine was presented with a Certificate of Award for being incorporated in the State of Maine for 100 years as of October 12, 2012. Of the thousands of business and nonprofit corporations in Maine, very few reach this milestone each year.

We were pleased to have Maine Secretary of State, Charles E. Summers, Jr., come to our Fall Conference and present this award to us.

While we have been incorporated in Maine for 100 years, GFWC Maine was organized on September 4, 1892, and was the first State to be admitted to the General Federation in 1894. Our volunteer service has spanned 120 years, a fact of which we are proud. Mr. Summers spent several minutes speaking with us about the accomplishments of our past history. Thanks to Sheri Walsh, our GFWC Maine Corresponding Secretary, we received excellent press and television coverage.

•Ann Palmer, a member of the GFWC Skowhegan Woman's Club, and also President of the Somerset County Maine Chapter of "Newborns in Need," which is the President's Special Project for this administration, was our luncheon speaker on Thursday, October 18<sup>th</sup>. It was a very touching and emotional presentation. Ann answered several questions for the clubwomen. Minnie McCormick, Chairman of the President's Project, presented a DVD about "Newborns in Need." Many clubwomen from across Maine brought knitted, crocheted, sewn, and store bought items for these babies.

•President-elect Mary Libby, did a nice job explaining the new "reporting" procedure for 2012. [JANUARY 15, 2013](#) was one of the outstanding points made for the annual reporting deadline for her and your President to [receive](#) these reports from all the Clubs.

•The "Pajama Wear It and Share It Banquet" was held on Thursday evening. It was a relaxing and cozy way to end a very busy day. Marilyn Cameron, pianist, and Susan Ramsey, violinist, from Dover-Foxcroft, entertained us with their music and sing-a-long which we all enjoyed. Bob Cress sang two duets with Susan. Members brought pajamas, nightgowns and toiletries to donate to the local domestic violence shelter. A reception followed in the President's room following the banquet.

•On October 19<sup>th</sup>, Kelly Brown, Assistant Director of, "The Next Step Domestic Violence Project," serving Washington and Hancock Counties, was the luncheon speaker. Kelly works with abuse victims from the beginning when victims come to the program, through to the end when they once again are able to be self sufficient and in control of their own lives. Accompanying her was Jessie

Stewart, a domestic violence abuse victim and survivor. Jessie told of her story of domestic abuse and recovery, to go on and further her education and advocate for other abuse victims. Kelly and Jessie picked up the nightwear and toiletries collected from our pajama party, and took the items back to the shelter.

•It is always a thrill to hear from our District Presidents and our State Chairmen on all the activities in which our members are involved! We are dedicated clubwomen striving to do everything possible to help our communities, our nation and our world. Thank you ladies for your wonderful reports and inspiring speeches! Special thanks to our 2012 LEADS graduate, Carol Jarvais, for her inspiring talk about being a LEADS ambassador and promoting the LEADS program. We are very proud of our newest LEADS gal!

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## **CLUB NEWS**

### **District 1**

In the meantime, members were getting ready for Marketplace and the trip to Fall Conference. Members provided GFWC/Maine with note cards for their fundraising table and brought many handmade items for Newborns in Need as well as PJ's and nightwear for the Hancock Domestic Violence shelter. The membership meeting was a soup and salad event at the North

Livermore Baptist Church. New members joined and others who could not attend sent word they, too, wish to join. The club did its semi-annual disbursement of funds to charities selected and enjoyed soups, salads and breads while members socialized. Looking forward to a good and busy Holiday season and winter!

With Fall comes the fruit of our labors and The **Research Club of Limerick** starts this season with our Pot Luck Supper in September and plans are made for the Holidays.

Several of our members attended the GFWC New England Region Conference and came away with renewed energy and plans for future membership.

In October, Pam Payeur, Co-founder of "Wounded Heroes of Maine Program" gave an invigorating account of what volunteers have done to aid our military Heroes in Maine recover after fighting for our freedoms. This has also become our Presidents special project.

In October the Gorham Woman's Club welcomed a new member and had a lively potluck luncheon around the theme "Mind Challenge Games – Laughter is a Healthy Thing". From a challenging "How Well do You Know Maine" quiz; to laughter while reviewing "How to Give a Cat a Pill"; and ending with a knowledge building "Woman's Club Bingo" everyone's minds and hearts were enjoyably entertained.

There were four members that attended the New England Regional Conference in Portland

and three members who attended the GFWC-Maine Fall Conference in Ellsworth.

The October meeting was dedicated to the club's annual orientation, including reports from each Committee Chairman, and a unanimous acceptance of the of the Annual Club Budget compiled by Club Treasurer, Charlotte Gulezian. Some lovely items were collected for "Newborns in Need" project and President Judi Lawrence gathered them to deliver to President Cress at the GFWC Maine Fall Conference. The next couple of months will be very busy with the club's Election

Day Bake Sale at the Town Office and the continual gathering of donations for the club's local Food Pantry plus starting the collection of children's gifts and books for the fast-approaching holidays. Members are all excited about a wonderful club program of speakers that will include two of its scholarship recipients, a physical rehabilitation program presentation and a presentation by a member of an international charitable program. More information will be provided as events progress!

**GFWC Skowhegan Woman's Club** finished selling refreshments at the eight-week summer Concerts in the Park. Thanks to the good weather, the club was able to raise \$562. For the GFWC New England Regional Conference held in Portland, members gathered together to bag the "sea glass soap" table favors made for the "Evening at the Beach and Maxine Russakoff made all of the origami loons for the "Picnic at the Lake" luncheon. They started their year in September with Ann Palmer speaking on the President's Project "Newborns in Need," and members brought in cold weather sleepers for the babies. At their October meeting, members took 200 purple ribbons attached to a Domestic Violence Awareness Month cards made by a member to be distributed within our community. They put them in beauty shops where they would reach a number of women and passed them out after a show at the Skowhegan Opera House. Members were busy coming up

with new ideas for the GFWC Maine Fall Conference Marketplace table as well as working on the old favorites. The Anniversary Celebration Committee, made up of ten members, has been preparing for their 130th Anniversary on November 3rd.

Throughout the summer, **GFWC Semper Fidelis Club** continues to maintain their Domestic Violence Garden at Coburn Park. They raised \$280 for heating assistance for the elderly through their Mother's Day Tea cards. The club recently finalized their largest fundraiser – the Birthday Calendar – netting over \$1,500. They are now selling poinsettias for Christmas, as well as Innisbrook. Their October speakers were Eliza Townsend from the Women's Lobby and Policy Center, which was quite informative, and Dr. Jack Gibson from the Somerset Woods Trustees, Maine's oldest land trust. He spoke on the upcoming Riverwalk project in Skowhegan. The club sold purple scarves for Domestic Violence Awareness month and raised \$250 with proceeds to go to the Domestic Violence Scholarship fund.

The **GFWC The Dove Society** started the year by joining the GFWC Skowhegan Woman's Club and GFWC Semper Fidelis Club to present An Afternoon With Margaret Chase Smith starring Sally Jones as Senator Smith at the Skowhegan Opera House. The show was amazing and the proceeds will be used to help the elderly with fuel

assistance. The club's own Lynnette King spent many hours organizing this wonderful play and thanks go to her for all she did. On October 17, the club enjoyed a tour of the History House led by recently retired Caretaker Lee Granville. His knowledge of the house and its contents is truly amazing. It was really a trip back in time. The 1839 Greek revival cottage is filled with antiques, furnishings, and memories of life in the mid 1800's in Skowhegan. The club's current fundraiser is RADA cutlery. It is a high-quality product and always reasonably priced. Next month the club will be decorating and selling wreaths. A membership wine and cheese evening was recently held and the club gathered at the park to clean and prepare our "Dove" garden for the winter. The club has also adopted the Margaret Chase Smith rose garden and the "Peace" garden nearby. The club looks forward to another successful and fun-filled year.

The *GFWC Skowhegan Three* clubs came together again to work at the GFWC New England Conference and made up all the centerpieces for each of the themed banquets and luncheons. As stated above, the clubs hosted the play "Mrs. Smith Goes to Washington." Over \$1600 was raised. The three clubs also recently participated in the Domestic Violence Awareness Vigil held at the gazebo in Coburn Park.

### *District 3*

The **GFWC/Dexter Women's Literary Club** held their annual secret auction and membership social in August, which everyone enjoyed. New club programs were handed out for the upcoming year as well. In September, GFWC Maine President Anne Cress and the President's Special Project Chairman Minnie McCormick attended the meeting and gave a presentation on Newborns In Need, complete with a DVD and a display of items required to support the project. Also in September, the club sponsored their annual baked bean supper and bake sale and did very well, taking in \$382.25. There was a brief meeting in October followed by a field trip to Spring Street Greenhouse in Dexter. All the club members thoroughly enjoyed a demonstration on corsage making and how to make a fall pumpkin floral arrangement. The corsages (with purple ribbons for domestic violence awareness) were given to Jane Gilbert, Elsie Mann, and Nina Speed, because they were going to the GFWC Maine Fall Conference. The pumpkin floral arrangement was won by Mary Morancie. The club donated items for Newborns in Need at the Fall Conference as well.

The Club women of the **GFWC/Cosmopolitan Club** of Dover-Foxcroft continue to support the ongoing projects they are involved with. With just 3 meetings to date, already collections have been received for 2 projects they support at the local hospital. Members have been

busy creating soft toys for "grannie's toys" and also continue to knit or crochet purple hats for the Period Of Purple Crying, the outreach program to bring awareness about Shaken Baby Syndrome. Two members attended the fall conference in Ellsworth and enjoyed the business sessions, the learning opportunities (even the part about the new reporting process!), and always a favorite - meeting with other GFWC friends from around the state. GFWC Maine President Anne Cress and Special Project Chairman Minnie McCormick visited the club recently. President Anne began by sharing a delightful history of GFWC Maine and then the members viewed the DVD "Newborns in Need," her special project. Following the video, Minnie presented additional information and showed many of the different items that were on their display table.

The **GFWC/MIOSAC Club** met on September 18 for a pot luck social where members had a chance to catch up with each other, laugh, talk, eat, and receive the club books for the 2012/2013 year. On October 1<sup>st</sup>, club members baked brownies and bar cookies for the Womancare domestic violence survivors' art show held at the Dover-Foxcroft Congregational Church. The club's first meeting of the year was our "Friends Together Souper Supper", when members are encouraged to bring a friend and enjoy soup, bread and dessert lovingly prepared by the members of the club's advisory committee.

The club gained one new member! After the soup dinner, members examined the Newborns in Need exhibit arranged by Ann Cress, GFWC Maine President, and Minnie McCormick, GFWC Maine President's Special Project Chairman. Members have been busy sewing, knitting and collecting items for this charity. Five club members attended the MFWC Fall Conference in Ellsworth, where Minnie McCormick showed the certificate awarded to the club on June 27<sup>th</sup> by Womancare, for the club's work in raising domestic violence awareness. Also in October, the club heard from the owner of a well-known hostel in Monson, Maine. The hostel rented 1,550 beds during the 2012 Appalachian Trail hiking season! The speaker also told of hikers inadequately provisioning themselves, such as underestimating their calorie needs, and/or wearing inadequate shoes, and of hikers who are former military service members walking off their tours of duty in war zones. On October 24, six club members met at Marion Doore Park in Dover-Foxcroft for the annual raking of the leaves. Caring for this park, named for a past club president is an ongoing club project, and this is the club's contribution to Make a Difference Day. Another on-going project for the club is collecting items on a "wish list" for the Bangor Ronald McDonald House. Each time the club meets, members bring paper towels, cleaning products, toilet papers, brownie mixes and other items useful to that charity. Club members plan to make the first delivery in

December. This beautiful autumn is passing by quickly, as club members work at ongoing projects and ready themselves for the coming holidays.

The **GFWC/Outlook Club** of Hartland kicked off the club year with a potluck supper before the meeting on October 4, with 8 members and 2 guests attending. Flowers were provided and tended at the Hartland Library over the summer, members continued to read and donate a quarter per book read toward the annual Library donation, and voluntary donations will continue to be accepted for CARE. It was voted to support the Newborns in Need project both a club donation of \$25 each year for the two years and member donations of money and needed items.

**GFWC Newport Woman's Club** honored Claudette Amoroso and Jane Briggs with 25 year pins at their September meeting. As clubs search for new members, this pin recognizes the many years of service as well as the importance of retention of existing members. GFWC Maine President Anne Cress and the President's Special Project Chairman Minnie McCormick presented the "Newborns In Need" project at the October meeting. A box of personal care items is being prepared to send to Afghanistan. The granddaughter of a club member is stationed there. Again this year the club is one of the eight non-profit partners of "Sparkle", Sebasticook Valley Chamber of Commerce's "United" fundraiser.

Club members attend meetings, sell adds, provide auction items, cook, and sell tickets for the event. The proceeds of the event are then divided among the eight partner groups. Four members attended the Fall Conference in Ellsworth.

The **Patten Woman's Club** is up and running again for the year and so far they have not had any fundraisers but there will be one coming up in December - a \$100 Christmas Tree raffle that is usually a big hit. They are donating monthly to the local food pantry which is badly in need and have also donated to help out with their Holidays meals - all greatly appreciated. The club also donates yearly to Toys for Tots which is huge in their area. They are looking into a local charity effort to help out the area school children with winter jackets, but they are no longer participating in UNICEF.

The **Pittsfield ARTS Club** held their first meeting of the year on Monday September 10<sup>th</sup> at the home of Donna Chale. They welcomed 3 new members and it was great catching up with everyone. On October 8<sup>th</sup> the club welcomed State President Anne Cress and Minnie McCormick to their meeting. They presented the video on Newborns in Need, the president's project. They explained how the project helps many families and how the items will be distributed. Club members enjoyed hearing about the project and items were donated for this worthwhile cause. A very successful "Meet the

Candidate's Night "was held at the Pittsfield Town Council chambers on October 15<sup>th</sup>. Area candidates running for the House of Representatives, State Senate, and District Attorney were in attendance. Also candidates running for town council and school board also spoke at the event. Refreshments were served after the program and many folks mentioned how much they enjoyed the chance to meet the candidates who will appear on the ballot in November. The club will be busy baking items for the food sale that the Pittsfield Historical Society will hold at the town office on election day. Members will also help sell the baked goods. The Historical Society is the club's Community Improvement Project for the year. Renovations will be starting soon on replacing the roof and then work on the rest of the building will need to be made to get the building into shape. The building holds many papers and pictures of Pittsfield and its history, along with many of the club records and scrapbooks. A representative of the Pittsfield Food Pantry will speak at our meeting on November 12<sup>th</sup>. There is a need at many of the food pantries in the area and the club would like to help anyway they can. The club will hold their annual Christmas Craft auction on Sunday December 2<sup>nd</sup> at the Congregational Church Memorial Hall in Pittsfield at 2PM. The public is welcome to attend. This is now their biggest fundraiser. They will also sell Avon products to raise some funds. Members will collect gifts for the area Women's

Domestic Violence shelter at our Christmas party on December 10<sup>th</sup>. A busy and exciting time for club members.

The **Pittsfield Tuesday Club** held their September meeting at the Pittsfield Library at 1:00 pm. It was a planning meeting for the coming year. The members decided to remain an active club even though there are only six members at present. It was decided to have each member invite a guest to a meeting, thinking that perhaps guests might decide to become members of the club if they enjoyed what was going on. At the October meeting, Maxine Russakoff, ESO State Chairman presented a program on what ESO was all about. It was mentioned by several members that they didn't really know what ESO was and at least two members signed a pledge to start the membership process. There were 3 guests present and they seemed to enjoy the meeting. The November meeting speaker will be representing the Pittsfield Historical Society and speaking about the renovation of the Railroad Station building. This is a project that several organizations in Pittsfield are supporting. The December meeting will be the annual Christmas luncheon at Raejean Hersey's house. This is an event that is looked forward to by members as good food and fellowship is always enjoyed. The club will recess in January and February as the weather is so uncertain. The meetings will resume in March.

At the celebration the Fire and Ambulance Services was awarded a certificate of appreciation. The Chief and Assistant Chief were in attendance to accept the award. This was an award that the Winterport Woman's Club GFWC received in 2011 and was asked by the Spirit of America Foundation to select the recipient for 2012. Scrapbooks and memorabilia were shared. Sandy Seamans, Nursing Supervisor, presented a slide presentation on Shingles. A very informed question and answer followed the presentation.

A field trip to Catherine Hill's Winery of Cherryfield was held October 11 followed by a luncheon at the Fisherman's Wife Cafe' in Milbridge. Guests were also in attendance.

Anne Cress, President of the Maine Federation of Women's Club, will be the guest speaker at the October 25 meeting at Pat Treworgy's home.

At their April meeting members of the **Lubec Women's Club** bid farewell to their long-time president, CeCe Gardner. They also spent some time talking about the Club's previous activities and what members thought was important to be continued. Members were asked to think about what skills and how much time they could offer the club, and to come to the next meeting prepared to commit or not

commit. It was clear than unless we had both the will and the woman power to "man" a project, that project would have to be discontinued.

At the May meeting members reviewed April's list and proposed areas which would each need a "coordinator." Happily, several members stepped forward to "coordinate". Members also elected their club officers.

The June meeting focused on organizing the July 4th "Trash & Treasures" sale which required advertising, accepting and storing donations as well as selling on the day of the sale. Clean-up afterward also needed to be covered. Sign-up sheets allowed each member to commit as much or as little time as they wished. It had been agreed in advance that unless the necessary "slots" could be covered, the sale would not proceed, but everyone worked together and things went smoothly, both before, during, and after the sale. The club's scholarship fund swelled by \$1700 as a result.

In early June they sent out a survey to all members asking when they would find it most convenient to attend meetings. The results of those surveys were tallied and the resulting calendar for the year was announced at the July meeting.

The GFWC Home Life Community Service PROGRAM (formerly called "collaboration") is designed to inform members of issues that affect the well-being of individuals, families, and communities.

GFWC members have a rich history of solving problems in their communities and in the nation with a "hands on" approach. One of the goals of this program is to identify the needs of the community, find the resources that are available, and create a

project to meet the need and make a difference.

This section of GFWC Home Life has no connections with other established organizations. We have the freedom to create anew...find the need...initiate a program...fill the need. We encourage you to involve other members of your community, other non-profit organizations, with whom you might work. If your project needs the "helping hands" of the younger generation, consider the student your group sponsored to Maine Youth Leadership, (MYL) the scout group you help sponsor. High school seniors need 25 hours of community service to graduate. We need to just ask.

GFWC recognizes one outstanding project with a \$50 award. A narrative report with all the "nuts and bolts" needs to be sent to me when club reports are due. One will be chosen to represent the state of Maine. Successful projects may be featured in a future GFWC Handbook. For example, in the 2012-2014 manual, a successful project tells of a club that enlisted the help of a 6th. grade class to help with a Bingo game for residents of a local nursing home. The students earn community service hours as they interact with residents by playing BINGO, distributing prizes, and sharing snacks. The club provides prizes such as puzzle books, jewelry and much more. It's a win-win situation for all involved.

As you've heard before...write a narrative...let us know WHAT you are doing and HOW you are doing it.. You HAVE to be IN it...to WIN it!
