

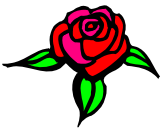

At the GFWC/MFVC Spring Convention, District 2 clubs were well represented and received many awards for their community work during the last year. We were especially proud of the **GFWC/The Dove Society** as they were awarded the Carolyn Lombardi Trophy for the second consecutive year. Also, at the convention, District 2 received some disturbing news as the Madison Woman's Club reported that they were dissolving. We will miss them and hope they will, once again, join us in the future.

May serves as the end of the club year for most and, as such, brings with it the installation of the newly elected officers and board members. The **GFWC/Skowhegan Woman's Club** and the **Waldoboro Woman's Club** had David Barter, past state president, install their new slate of officers with the assistance of the outgoing presidents of the clubs. New members were also inducted into the **GFWC/Skowhegan Woman's Club** and the **GFWC Semper Fidelis Club**.

May also is she time when we think of helping those who wish to continue their education. The awarding of \$500 scholarships to graduating seniors as reported by the **GFWC/Skowhegan Woman's Club** (two) and **GFWC/The Dove Society** (four). **Waldoboro woman's Cub** awarded seven scholarships of \$1000 each. Three of those scholarships went to continuing education students and four to high

school seniors. This was made possible, in part by the success of the **Waldoboro Woman's Club's** annual Whale of a Sale fundraiser where more than \$2600 was raised for scholarships. The event featured a bake sale, plant sale, food sale Treasures from the Attic, Jewelry boutique, raffle and silent auction as well as a popular crab roll, blueberry cobbler and ice cream lunch.

Besides the above fundraiser, members of the **Waldoboro Woman's Club** volunteer at Sea Thrift Cottage at Lincoln Home in Newcastle and will be helping at a White Elephant and bake sale there during Founder's Day in August. They also open the German Church for visitors every afternoon during July and August and help provide refreshments for the annual service on the first Sunday in August.

The **GFWC/Livermore Falls Women's Club** reported programs on Domestic Violence, Multiple Sclerosis, and Service dogs. They held a Project Linus workshop during which they made 7 blankets and pieced together 2 afghans. Club members support the Norland's Living History Center and, after the disastrous fire, members and middle school students worked together to clean and replant the flower garden. Then they helped with a 'thank you' picnic for the 11 fire centers that worked so hard to save the historic mansion. Their garden committee planted flowers at the Gateway garden, started a garden at the new Paper Museum, and raised close to \$1800 by holding a plant sale to benefit the library.

They planted the 'leftover plants' near public buildings. After all of this, they had time to celebrate the 100th birthday of one of their members, Helen Coburn.

GFWC/Semper Fidelis Club members have participated in the Women's Ride for Heart Health (a 5, 10, or 25 mile bike ride) in Freeport, paddled canoes for Pine Tree Camp, biked in the Trek Across Maine for the American Lung Association, and participated in the Relay for Life Walk for the American Cancer Society. They also participated in various activities for the Skowhegan Riverfest. To top all of this off, they still have enough energy left to meet on Monday evenings for walks around the high school track!

GFWC/Skowhegan Woman's Club reported that Maxine Russakoff was awarded their Enid Currier Volunteer of the Year award. In June, they had the planning meeting to prepare the program for the coming year. This summer, their members have provided baked goods and cold drinks to be sold at the Summer Concerts at Coburn Park, each Sunday evening throughout July and August. Members have also been busy making craft items to raise funds for the coming year.

GFWC/The Dove society held a yard sale fundraiser in July and have plans for an August "planning" meeting.

Plans were made to gather women from various

community organizations for a meeting at Lakewood Theater on August 17th. Participants will see a play, have a reception during intermission with desserts being made available, and socialize with members from other organizations. This is being promoted by the **GFWC/Semper Fidelis Club**.

Educational Loan Fund

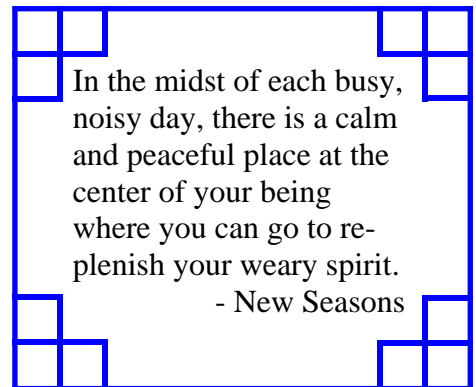

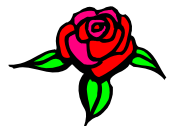
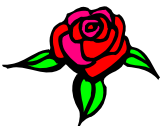
