


## **EPSILON SIGMA OMICRON - ESO**



#### Be a Healthy Communicator...

Healthy communication is so much more than talk. It's not experience or talent, but it is a skill that can be developed. Successful communication is about learning how to connect with people. While it may seem like some are just "born with it", the fact is anyone can learn how to make every communication into opportunity for a powerful connection.

The five practices to develop the crucial skill of healthy communicating through connecting include:

- > Finding common ground,
- Keeping your communication simple
- Connecting through values
- Inspiring people
- Staying authentic in all your relationships

Brene Brown author, *The Gifts of Imperfection*, defines connection as the energy that exists between people when they feel seen, heard, and valued; when they can give and receive without judgement; and they derive sustenance and strength from the relationship.

Engage your members by asking them what they like and what they dislike. Although we don't like to hear what our members dislike, you should remember you can learn as much from the dislikes as you can from the likes on the direction your club needs to go. Take it a step further and



have your club's officers share what they think is going well and what they feel can go better. This open conversation brings members engaged as a vital role in the direction of their club.

Engaged members are more satisfied, will see more value in their membership, and will participate in more activities.

Taking the time to develop and execute a strong communications strategy, one that employs different ideas to effectively to engage your members.

## **LEADERSHIP**

#### SET ACHIEVABLE GOALS AND CAST A COMPELLING VISION

I wish to share with you an article written by Suellen Brazil, GFWC 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President. This is one of the many valuable articles available in the **GFWC Member Portal** under the *Leadership Tool Kit*, available to all GFWC members.

MAKE OUR FUTURE EXTRAORDINARY: GFWC leaders carefully consider our organization's needs and potential leaders with knowledge and skills to move closer to realizing a shared vision. Surround yourself with the absolute BEST dedicated leaders and volunteers willing to take risks! There are those who do not just want to be "good" - they want to be "GREAT!" So, find them and together forge

are those who do not just want to be "good" - they want to be "GREAT!" So, find them and together forgetyour path. What makes that difference and how can you move to that level of excellence in Leadership?

#### **GREAT LEADERS:**

- Gain a deep knowledge and variety of experiences
- Demonstrate enthusiasm, energy, and creativity
- Are passionate about what they are doing
- Have a deep sense of commitment and responsibility
- Believe in goals and the team's ability to accomplish them
- Take the ordinary and make it extraordinary
- Equip and organize other for success
- Are supportive of the team
- Are flexible and can regroup
- Handle problems or disappointments respectfully
- Use feedback and evaluation as a powerful tool

**TOGETHER WE ARE BETTER:** Developing a strong vision and planning for success involves consistently sharing the vision with others on our team. Communicate your vision, gain feedback and insight from others, and refine it. Communicate the vision and thinking behind it regularly and remembering to get others on board. This will ensure a shared vision that belongs to everyone. If we want to lead to the next level, we must develop a plan of action. Consider these:

- Formalize your goals. Write out your goals. This helps formalize language and creates accountability. Focus on 3 5 goals that will ensure your team's maximum impact and then focus on them with great clarity
- Write SMART goals. Often goals are not accomplished because they are vague. Goals should be SMART: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Time-Based. If goals are well defined, members will know exactly what is desired.
- Prioritize Goals. In considering all you want to accomplish; your list may be too long. Do not
  overwhelm your team by trying to do everything. This may well minimize your overall impact.
  Determine which goals are essential to achieving the greatest impact while strengthening your
  organization.
- Develop Team Ownership. When setting goals, it is essential to develop enthusiasm for and ownership by leaders. Engage them in discussions and brainstorming. This process will lead to stronger commitment and ownership of the goals.

**CREAT UNSTOPPABLE MOMENTUM – VISION CASTING:** Average results can be pretty comfortable. The question is: Do you want average results...or *the best* results possible? Vision casting is often considered the privilege of the top officer or leader. To make long-lasting impact, work collaboratively with the leadership team to take your vision to the next level. Define it and the steps necessary. A clear, powerful vision gives others a reason to jump on board. Consider these four steps to effective vision casting:

- Brainstorm your vision
- Determine if it is possible
- Commit to a direction
- Create an unstoppable momentum

Create the vision for our future. Connect at some level of the progression daily. Push the momentum, share outcomes, and inspire others to join you. Celebrate accomplishments and recommit to the vision. Take control of circumstances, cast a vision for our future, and move toward the GFWC we were meant to lead!
