In preparing what I wanted to share in this edition of PTNs I read a quote that fits perfectly for us to consider starting out in this New Year. "Ability is what you're capable of doing ~ Motivation determines what you do ~ Attitude determines how well you do it."

There is still lots of time for you to engage your membership in focusing on the Signature Program. January is a perfect time to consider one of these programs for your Club. Here are several projects you could possibly consider this year or later.

Movie Night – GFWC Florida – The choice of movies depicted domestic violence in many areas. Movies shown were, The Guardians (systemic abuse of the elderly), Sleeping with the Enemy (spousal abuse), Gaslight (spousal abuse), The Hand That Rocks the Cradle (nanny abuse), and Monster-in-Law (mother-in-law abuse). Members could get together and watch or give the Movie titles out to members for them to watch at home with family and friends.

Wear a Pair, Bring a Pair GFWC Maine – GFWC Semper Fidelis - This project collaborated with Skowhegan Main Street's weekend-long "Skow- Whoville" holiday celebration. The public event was held at a popular local wine bar, and it was requested that attendees come wearing their pajamas and bring a children's pair, along with a stuffed animal to donate to the local Family Violence Shelter. You could adapt this program that would work best for you Club and Community.

PJ & Pearls Brunch GFWC South Carolina – Members invited their family and friends to a beautifully prepared brunch. Attendees were encouraged to wear their PJs & Pearls. The Brunch included music and an inspirational program. The representative and guest speaker were from the local Children's Advocacy Center and were presented with a check from the proceeds. This could also be adapted to fit in with your members and community.

Flashlights for Domestic Violence Victims - GFWC Delaware – GFWC Past Presidents Club This project collects and distributes small flashlights to shelters and organizations that work with victims of Domestic Violence, including Human Trafficking. When the victims decide to escape their circumstances, it is often in the middle of the night, and they leave quickly and with no time to pack items. Small flashlights can easily fit in your pocket. The flashlight allows a person to see hazards and street signs.

Your Chairman is always watching her mailbox for donations for the Elder Abuse Essay Scholarship Fund. If your Club hasn't mailed in your donation, please consider doing it now! Your Chairman is still believing that we can have at least 90% of our Clubs donating before the end of this administration. We together can do this!

Here are words I took from a quote but not exactly as quoted. # **GFWC PRESS RELEASE - National Day**

Washington, DC, December 20, 2023 — The inaugural General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) National Day of Service (NDS) proved impactful in raising food resources for communities across the country. This year's campaign spotlighted the food insecurity and hunger crisis. The results received from the "NDS Impact Report" sent to participating clubs indicate GFWC clubwomen collected 290,982 pounds of nonperishable food, recorded more than 40,000 volunteer hours, collected \$276,832 in monetary donations, and contributed to the preparation of more than 241,672 meals.

- Muscle weakness
- Protrusion of eyes
- Accelerated loss of calcium in bones
- Loss of scalp hair

Up to 60% of those with thyroid disease are unaware of their condition. 1 in 8 women will develop thyroid disease in their lifetime. Thyroid conditions are treatable with medication or in some cases, surgery. Your medical history, a physical exam and specialized blood test are used to diagnose the disease.

I am hoping many of the GFWC Maine Clubs are gathering information for reporting activities done around the environment! Last PTN I left you with a cliffhanger about plastics. Now, the rest of the story...

**Not all plastic is created equal** (there *are numerous chemical formulas to create a specific plastic* for a specific need). This complexity about plastic and how it may not be recycled should be a <u>part of the beginning discussions of any plastic product being manufactured</u>. If companies create the product *but* do not have the process in place to recycle plastic at the end of its use, <u>society is</u> left with an extreme amount of waste.

Many of us think because there is a recycling symbol and a number on a plastic item, it will be recycled. **Wrong.** Only 10% of plastic can be recycled at this time. Countries around the world are working on this problem and realize their interconnectedness in this issue.

Only half of the United States has access to recycling. Those that do each have their own rules about what gets recycled and how. Recycling is a complicated issue. Do you know how your town operates their recycling of plastic? Does the town receive money for the efforts? What problems need a solution in 2024?

After listening to a webinar recently, my eyes have been opened to the complexity of towns and businesses must manage plastics. Businesses must invest more money and we the public need to become more aware of the problems of how any plastic ends its recycling life in the environment. Recycling is costly but our planet is our only home for now. We all need to pay attention and help keep our big blue planet as healthy as possible, now and for the future.

The donations of books on domestic violence to two agencies in our area were so popular that our Book Project Coordinator was asked about the possibility of donating more books. These sets of books are written for children and will be used by the receiving agencies to aid in the discussion of violence in the home. These are not circulating books but read with a counselor who can aid a child in distress. Situations occur where children are not aware of what a normal household (read loving) is like, might not know that negative language and put downs are abusive, might not know a person, even a child, can reach out for help.

In November at our regular meeting, we collected shoes for the Somerset Animal Shelter. The Shelter hopes for a minimum of 2500 pairs of gently used or new shoes to be donated each year. Once that amount is reached, the Shelter contacts their partner Funds2Orgs which picks up and processes the shoes. When completed, Funds2Org sends the Shelter a check averaging between \$1,200 and \$1,500 yearly. The shoes are sent to developing countries where over 4,000 micro entrepreneurs sell the shoes as a way of making a living. A sure win/win for all. I am proud to announce that two of our members have volunteered a total of 97.75 hours at the Travis Mills Foundation this year.

Skowhegan opens the Christmas season with a parade and various activities beginning the first Friday of December. With delight our Club once again participated by offering sugar cookies for decorating in Computer Improvements



on Water Street on December 3<sup>rd</sup>. Our baking and decorating ladies were happily engaged, after a two-year break, with area children.
